Developmental Responsiveness

- Advisory Period Morning Meetings bi-monthly focusing on character education
- · School counselor modules, grade level expectation meetings
- Student Council leader monthly meetings with principal
- Comprehensive Behavior Analytic Program students participate in Community Based Instruction opportunities
- Grade 8 students are able to selective electives related to their interest electives are run by semester
- Interdisciplinary activities focused around big-ideas of the curriculum such as Veteran's Day, Martin Luther King Day, Holocaust Remembrance Day, Youth Summit Day, and Character Education Day.

Organizational Support

- Team model three teams per grade level
- Team of teachers, school counselor and grade level administrator attend daily team meetings
- Two team meetings a week focus on vertical articulation by department and co-teaching planning
- Professional Learning Community Model (PLC) Common planning time for teams and departments
- Administrators are assigned specific building responsibilities to help guide and support teachers
- · Utilization of online calendar for school events and activities
- Implementation on Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) testing to guide teachers to meet individual student learning needs and class instruction
- Professional development opportunities include district organized staff colleges offered in the Fall, Spring and Summer.
 Courses are created and taught by teachers and school administrators
- Mentor program for new teachers
- Transitional programs include school counseling visits to 5th grade classes, transition meetings with school personnel to discuss each rising 6th grader
- Summer camp transition program for rising 6th graders, school visitation opportunities, walk-throughs, parent orientation and Coffee with the Principal
- Full Child Study Team on site and Student Assistance Counselor
- Intervention and Referral Services Committee which identifies and supports at-risk students
- · Clubs, parent run athletics and aftercare program on-site
