# **School Characteristics and Replicable Practices**

#### **Academic Excellence**

- Literacy emphasis of creating claims, using evidence, and backing it up (C.U.B. Writing) accompanied by depth of knowledge level 3 questioning in all subject areas.
- Spanish Dual language immersion program
- Open access to honors level courses for all students
- Universal use of curriculum maps and/or pacing guides and common assessments for data-driven decisionmaking to inform instruction on the part of teachers.
- Heterogeneous classroom environments for English Learners
- School-wide implementation of Kagan strategies for productive student collaboration
- Emphasis on informational text in all core departments to promote reading, writing, listening, and speaking skills
- Regularly scheduled professional development on school-wide initiatives
- Special education push-in and co-teach collaborative classrooms
- Use of Document-Based Questioning (DBQ) in social science and English/language arts to appropriately scaffold for diverse learners
- Three tiers of intervention supports offered in English and mathematics during the school day.

## **Developmental Responsiveness**

- Positive behavior intervention supports encompass a school-wide approach to teaching and reward behavior expectations.
- Counselor provides supports in the areas of academic preparation/planning, bullying prevention, personal/social supports, and college/career planning.
- Students are rewarded with a school-wide economy system (Cub Cash) to promote responsible, respectful, and safe behaviors that can be redeemed for various types of rewards and incentives.
- Support staff includes a counselor, nurse, school psychologist, instructional aides, and speech therapist
- 7-period day to provide a class of intervention or enrichment depending on the needs of every child.
- A wide array of school-wide activities to promote connectedness and student spirit.
- Parent-teacher conferences offered three times yearly for students in need of additional academic and/or social/emotional supports including jump start conferences prior to the start of the school year in August.
- School to home communication which include phone messages, a parent portal, website, marquee, report card newsletter and parent nights.
- Community partnerships include Adopt-A-School partners, Church partners, and Healing Connections (a combination of outside support agencies).
- Co-curricular opportunities that include the before/after school program, clubs, athletic teams, robotics team, marching band/auxiliary units, choir, drama, leadership, and after-school tutoring.
- Parent and Community members involving themselves in school events, school luncheons, field trips, campus support, and performances.

### Social Equity

- Dual immersion Spanish program and a Spanish elective offering.
- Access to technology through use of computer labs, iPads, and Chromebooks using google docs.
- Culturally diverse learning materials offered through the library.
- English learner mentoring campaign to ensure every English learner has an adult advocate.
- Leadership class emphasis includes promoting kindness, appreciation, tolerance, and acceptance.
- Assemblies that incorporate relevant topics in support of the social/emotional needs of all students.
- Kindness club that promotes connectivity through activities that bring students and staff members together.
- An anonymous reporting system to provide students a safe place to report problems and/or concerns that need to be addressed.
- Recognition of a wide array of achievements which include academic achievements, effort levels, perfect and improved attendance, and good and improved behaviors.
- Comprehensive hiring process for teaching staff to acquire the best and most diverse teaching staff to mirror the school demographics.
- Opportunities for parents to become involved in conferences, IEPs, SSTs, PTSA, School Site Council, and English Learner Advisory Committees.

## **Organizational Support**

- 7-period day to offer "Cub Academy" enrichment/intervention support based on the needs of every child.
- Our campus Instructional Leadership Team open to all certificated staff to collaborate for share-decision making.
- A core Focus team that participates in District-wide leadership training.
- Early release Wednesdays to allow for strategic professional development and department chair led professional learning communities.
- An onsite technology coach (iCoach) that provides ongoing technology training and supports to staff.
- Counselor led student study teams to identify and implement supports needed for struggling students.

## **Organizational Support (cont'd)**

- Ongoing and consistent campus to home communication including phone messages, a parent portal, website, marquee, report card newsletters and parent nights.
- A Stragetic Plan for Student Achievement created using the valuable input of all school community stakeholders.
- Strategic events held to address the transition of 6<sup>th</sup> graders into the middle school environment which include a parent night, school showcase, summer registration, and a staggered start to the first day of school.
- A college-going culture integrated into all aspects of the school community.
- Data-driven instruction through common assessment data using multiple data management systems.
